### REGATTA RESULTS

## Hanson and Schreck win Hospitality Regatta by Mary Doolittle

It seems that GYA and those Lillian Alabamians have captivated an awful lot of the Flying Scot Laurels this past year and the Hospitality Regatta, which was held in Jackson, Mississippi by Fleet 45 in October, was no exception. Honors were again captured by a Gulf District Boat. GYA-11, this time, which was sailed so ably by Rocky Hanson with Paul Schreck as his crew. Both are from Lillian, Alabama and it appears that we Northerners better remove our boats from storage in time to attend the MID-WINTER'S REGATTA at Ft. Myers, Florida in March and sail on some of those Gulf District waters to see if we can discover some of their secrets. Since those Gulf District Boats beat us on our waters as well as theirs, they must know something that we don't.

Rocky Hanson took a third, first and a seventh for a total of 10% pts. to capture First Place Honors. Immediate past Texas District Governor, Fred Tears, was right behind Rocky in 2nd place with 14% pts. Another GYA Boat sailed by John Morrow of Panama City, Florida was third. What happened fellows? You let our own Vince DiMaio sneak in and take fourth place with his *Home Made Boat*. The next non-Gulf, non-Texas District boat was Hillis Eskridge, the Prairie District Governor from Tulsa, Oklahoma, taking thirteenth place.

Anyone who did not attend the Hospitality Regatta missed a tremendous experience. This was a first for your Corresponding Secretary and her husband and one we will never forget. Ross Barnett Reservoir or Pearl River Reservoir is about 20 miles long and 4 miles wide and is a beautiful body of water. We witnessed 208 boats from 14 states get retrieved from the water in less than two hours. We were most impressed with the flawless functioning of the three separate race committees directing eleven fleets on three different courses, simultaneously. The organization of the entire regatta was simply fantastic. The Flying Scot was the largest fleet represented with 37 Scots entered. Jackson Yacht Club has down pat, the meaning of, Hospitality. Also, they practice what they preach. We were all treated like Royalty with excellent food and great fun and fellowship.

## Beckner Wins Riverside Fall Invitational Series by Franklin Bloomer

Dick Beckner of the Candlewood Lake Fleet, sailing St. Elmo's Fire, won Fleet No. 7's second annual Fall Invitational Series off Riverside, Conn. Three races were held, one each on October 4, 11 and 17 in strong, light and very strong wind conditions. Ten visitors joined 17 local boats at one time or another in the Series which was run informally, without prizes, as an extension of summer racing.

The first race was sailed in northwest winds of 12-20 knots, with gusts to 25 knots, over a triangular course of about 5½ miles. Franklin Bloomer of the host fleet won the race, leading at every mark. A bizarre incident on the final windward leg led to the withdrawal of Ralph Manee of Shore Acres, N.J. Manee on port tack crossed FSSA Measurer Chuck Edgar on starboard, passing easily ahead of him. Unknown to him, however, Manee was dragging a spinnaker sheet and the line somehow managed to catch itself on Edgar's bow or forestay. As a consequence, Edgar's boat was suddenly (and quite unexpectedly) pulled about onto port tack and, with jib and crew caught on the wrong side, Edgar capsized. The offending spinnaker sheet, having done its dirty work, now dislodged itself, and Manee withdrew. Edgar righted his boat and finished second (thereby improving his position in the race), with Ken Parmelee third.

The second race was sailed in a southeast breeze which never exceeded six knots over a triangular course of 3 miles and was close throughout. Steve Ungberg of Riverside rounded the windward mark first, closely pursued by Parmelee, Nelson Winget, Bloomer and Dave Griffin. Ungberg was still leading, after a long spinnaker run in which the fleet spread out considerably, but he was passed by Bloomer on the succeeding reach. The final boat to the finish, no more than a quarter-mile in length, saw Parmelee move from fourth to first to win by a boat length over Bloomer, with Griffin third.

For the third race, the stage appeared to be set for a show-down between Bloomer and Parmelee for the Series, with no one else seemingly within striking distance. Neither finished the race. The wind, which did not appear so strong at the Club, was shifty and blowing up to about 30 knots out of the northwest at the start, and it gusted to close to 40 during the race. The air temperature was in the low 40's. Only 9 boats started the race, sailed over a windward-leeward-windward course of 7½ miles, and only 3 finished. Bloomer was disabled and retired just after the start; Parmelee capsized and, although he righted his boat, was unable to continue when one of his crew had to be picked up by another boat. Two other boats capsized and swamped. Manee led at each mark to win easily, with Beckner second. The other finisher, Mario Pasquini of Throngs Neck, New York, was disqualified on protest by Beckner for having failed to pass on the channel side of a government buoy during the first windward leg.

Beckner was the only boat in the Series to finish all 3 races without a disqualification and his record of 5-18-2 gave him a low-point. score of 25 points. Bloomer was second with 1-2-DNF for 26% points, Parmelee third with 3-1-DNF for 27% and Manee fourth with WD-5-1 for 29%.

### Jerry Derryberry Wins Southern Championship by Rick Tears

The fourth running of the Southern Regional Championship took place on Cross Lake in Shreveport, La. on November 21-22 with seven boats, the majority from Dallas, Texas. The pre-regatta conversation had Mike Haggerty 1st., Fred Tears 2nd, and Jerry Derryberry and Rick Tears tied for 3rd.

The course used was a modified Olympic with 2 runs, 2 reaches, and 3 beats, truly a trying and fair course. The low point Olympic scoring system with one throwout was also used. The Shreveport Yacht Club ran its usual impeccable starting lines, excellently laid courses, punctuality, and above all hospitality and graciousness. I have entered at least 12 regatta there, and never had a race that was not excellently run, they are amazing.

The first race was S-SE about 12-15 mph. Jerry Derryberry finished first, with Rick Tears second and Brian Buzzell third. Rick Tears pulled a stupid jibe on the first run and let Jerry pass him, he never got close to him after that.

In the second race, Mike Haggerty found the combination and finished first with Rick Tears and Jerry Derryberry following in that order.

Jerry won the heavy air race (18 mph) going away. Rick Tears and Brian Buzzell followed having a 20 some odd tacking duel on the last leg before finishing in 2 and 3 respectively.

Jerry wrapped it up by winning the fourth race on Sunday morning (Ho-Hum). Rick was again second and Brian Buzzell was third. The last race, by far the lightest (8-10 mph) was essentially a race for third place. The first two places were already won.

Rick led at the first three marks. Mike Haggerty led at the 5th & 6th. Fred Tears at the 7th. Mike Haggerty and Brian Buzzell were in a hot covering duel, at least as hot as it can get in 8 mph. Rick Tears finished 1st, Fred Tears 2nd, Mike Haggerty 3rd, Jerry Derryberry 4th, and Brian Buzzell 5th. The box score follows:
