

Being of the Old guard (20 plus years in the Class) using heavy vang ran counter to the grain as I'm sure it does with many who attest to Sandy's and Eric's strict one design philosophy. However, many of us (old guard) started being left in the dust to windward in a blow by those who were not concerned about heavy vanging. It is hard to deny that the boat goes better that way.

As long as it is legal to vang and legal to lead the vang control aft, why not allow the best possible fitting to handle it. The 360 will make the adjustments more, user friendly and is far superior to the new "console" or other turning blocks, cleats etc. Can we survive without it? Of course we can but we will save more booms with it and make one of the few adjustments we can make easier, more efficient etc. It will not make the boat any faster and will not give the "Hot Shots" an advantage and it will not compromise our very high one design standards. It's just better!

To the Editor:

I received the Jan.-Feb. issue of Scots n' Water and was shocked by the cover photo. Taylor Smith is demonstrating what you must <u>never</u> do, get under a boat lifted by hoist and bridle. I am sure other Scot owners will join me in pointing out the danger, but I write from personal experience.

While guiding a Scot on a hoist toward the trailer, I had the lifting bridle break. The boat dropped about two feet with the transom close enough to my nose to make a lasting impression. The weld on the large ring had given away.

On a second safety matter under discussion let me repeat a method I described a few years ago for getting back into a Scot from the water. It is essential to have a step for a foot to bring the chest up to the deck level or above. The rudder head and tiller are grasped for easy reentry. Make the foot loop from a second safety line rigged across the transom on the rings. One end of this second line has a snap hook which is removed from the ring and snapped on the fixed safety line. The foot line then sinks to make a loop at the proper depth. Don't use floating line.

This rig was invented in the water as I made a foot loop from a spinnaker sheet to enable re-entry when wearing rain gear and boots. I hope other Flying Scot sailors will learn from my experiences.

Dear Editor:

In 1995 New Haven, Connecticut will be hosting the Special World Games involving 2,000-3,000 olympians from 60 plus nations. For the first time the event will include a sailing program. There will also be a Pre-Olympic Regatta on "July 9-10, 1994" which will act as a dress rehearsal.

The "Flying Scot" has been chosen for the Double Unified Event - two crew, two special athletes, plus safety officer (preferably the FS owner).

The games will run from July 1-9, 1995, however my immediate concern is the Pre-Olympic Regatta on July 9-10, 1994.

We will need 20-25 Scots for the 1994 and 1995 regattas including the boat owner or his representative to be the safety officer.

Liability and other insurance will be the responsibility of the Special Olympics and as to an incentive, we will attempt to give the boat owner's participating in the 1995 event the new sails used in that event at little or no cost. The boats should be in good condition. Keep in mind that media coverage will be on the "International Level" which will give the Flying Scot and FSSA excellent "PR." Plus it will be a very rewarding experience for you.

From the Editor:

Almost 5,000 Flying Scots built to date. 1,5669 members of Flying Scot Sailing Association. Only about 10% of Scot owners race.

What do these numbers mean?

- We are missing alot of unique individuals that could be sharing their experiences with Scots.
- 2. The emphasis of Scots n' Water should be centered around the way people are enjoying the boat. This does not mean all stories about racing, if you look at the numbers.
- 3. As Flying Scot owners, we are not reaching out to people that are cruisers or day sailing, new owners of used or new boats or people thinking of buying a Flying Scot.
- 4. We need to get behind our boat builder Flying Scots Inc. Harry and Karen Carpenter, and go the extra mile to talk to people in Scots to show them how much we enjoy our boats and that there is an organization that supports owners.

NO THIS IS NOT MEANT TO BE A BIG MEMBERSHIP DRIVE TO JOIN THE ASSOCIATION, (although it might work like that). AS EDITOR, I WOULD LIKE TO REACH MORE PEOPLE, WITH - MORE INTERESTING ARTICLES THAT APPLY TO MORE BOAT OWNERS. THE ONLY WAY TO DO THIS IS TO FIND OUT WHO OWNS BOATS. TO DO THAT, I NEED YOU TO HELP.

Have you ever been to your club, on vacation, on business or visiting family or friends and seen a Scot? Would it be possible to jot a note saying, I own a Scot, and a few details saying that it was pretty exciting to see one while you were in the area? Leave your name and boat number. Maybe the owner feels like he's the only one that owns a Scot.

I'm sure some of you racers feel that

you would know the owner or the boat number if he raced . . . Well let's look at that in another light . . . Perhaps just because a person doesn't race (and there are a lot of reasons why people don't or choose not to) they would appreciate the support and possibly some help of someone else who owns a boat like they do. We all know sailors are nice and friendly. Ask any other sailing class if Flying Scot owners and/or racers are known as the friendliest class. Ask any sail maker. We have a reputation to uphold.

In the last six months, I have received about 30 calls from people, a few not even boat owners, that have expressed an interest in talking to someone about Flying Scots. As little as Jerry and I have been at home this year, knowing they have called at least two different long distance numbers before reaching me, is pretty exciting.

We already have a system set up that could be a great way of reaching other Scot owners. It's called Districts and Fleets. You members of Fleets, see a Scot, leave a note, make a friend. If you are not a member of a Fleet call your District Governor and get names of people or fleets in your area and make contact. This organization is not set up for racing only. Use it as a common bond, a helping hand.

Wouldn't it be more fun to have fleet meetings to get to know people? In the future (not too distant) we are planning on gatherings of ALL OWNERS of Scots, meeting at boat shows, (it worked great this year in Atlantic City), we are planning on a group watching the sailing at the 1996 Olympics in Savannah, and could be if people are interested, get a group to go to Australia for the 2000 Olympics.

To further this idea of reaching more owners and hearing from more people, I

have assigned an issue to each District to see if you would like to be heard.

Your District Governor (hopefully) will participate and encourage the Fleet Captains to reach out to members and owners to have a voice in this magazine. Maybe there are questions to ask, funny stories to tell, ways to sail better, pictures to share, cruising experiences, history of fleets, people who have given so much to Scots to give a special thank-you to, regattas that are or were special in your District. Any number of ideas, maybe even how many new owners you have met by putting notes in boats . . .

The schedule will just roll — example TEXAS in 1995 will be Sept 1, PACIFIC AND CAROLINAS will be Nov 1 etc.

If it happens that I receive too much material for one issue, I will start with one district per issue . . . that would be nice . . . we'll see what happens.

If you have any questions call or write to me. One thing I would like to say is that this is your chance to zero in on a date to have your say. I hope it will promote group meetings and get togethers and everyone thinks it fun and not work.

Of course, letters to the editor, regatta reports and comments or questions that come up any time should be sent to me whenever you want to write. Don't think if you are in the Gulf District you can only send me things in April . . .

I appreciate all the articles I receive and look forward to hearing from you all the time.

1996 Olympic Sailing Events

Although the majority of events in the 1996 Olympic Games will be held in Atlanta, the lack of open water in the area necessitated the selection of a separate site for the sailing contests. Savannah, with its maritime heritage and easy access to open-water sailing areas, was a natural choice.

Ten separate classes of craft will be raced in "fleet races", meaning that the boats in each race will all be of the same design. Women will race 470s (two crew members), Sailboards (one crew member) and Europe Dinghies (one crew member). Men's classes include the 470 (two crew members), the Finn (one crew member), the Flying Dutchman (two crew members), the Tornado (two crew members), the Star (two crew members), the Soling (two crew members) and the Sailboard (one crew member).

Unlike yachting contests that involve handicapping, the "one-design" nature of the Olympic races makes them exciting and easy to understand for non-competitors. The winner of each race is, quite simply, the first boat across

the finish line. Just by keeping an eye on your favorite competitors, you'll know how they're faring in the race. In handicapped races, by contrast, a complex system of time adjustments makes it essentially impossible for those watching the race—and quite often the competitors—to determine any one boat's actual position.

The final scoring is also much simpler in the Olympic events. In the absence of handicapping, the gold medal is awarded to the boat with the best score (or the best series of finishes) after all the races in its class are completed.

But you don't have to wait until 1996 to enjoy the sailing in Savannah's waters. Beginning in 1993, the city will host a pre-Olympic regatta and a Maritime Festival each year until the Olympics begin. These programs will take place at the same time of year as the Olympic events and will offer a wide variety of activities. Call the Savannah Area Convention & Visitors Bureau at (912) 897-1612 for more information.

Olympic Sailing Events

Although the majority of events in the 1996 Olympic Games will be held in Atlanta, the site of the sailing contests will be Savannah. The sailing contests will be held between July 20 and August 4, 1996.

The FSSA Board is looking into the possibility of offering a package to include, rooms and spectator boat to watch the salling contests. Before a block of rooms can be secured, we need to know that there is enough interest to warrant pursuing this.

Rooms would be around \$100 a night because of the olympics. Also, the Coast Guard will be controlling the space for water participation on spectator boats.

Please notify headquarters immediately if you would be interested.

FSSA Board of Governors Minutes

Monday, March 28, 1994, 4:00 P.M. St. Andrews Bay Yacht Club Panama City, Florida

President Bernie Knight called the meeting to order. The roll was called and a quorum was established.

A motion was made, seconded and unanimously passed to approve the minutes as mailed.

The Treasurer's report was presented by Terry Dees-Kolenich. Things are in good financial shape at this time of year. Kolenich, Eubanks, Jacobsen, and Knight will meet in Columbia at headquarters and review the finances, budget and how the money is spent and look for ways to improve before presenting a proposed budget for next year. A motion was made, seconded and unanimously passed to approve the financial reports.

REPORTS MEASURER'S REPORT

Bob Neff, Measurer, gave the Chief Measurer's report. The committee is made up of Neff, Carpenter, Moore and Taggart. Paul Moore cast a dissenting vote, but the majority carried. Moore had been involved in "The Great Compromise of '79." With the advent of the consoles, they need to be specifically sanctioned in order to be legal. Neff is working on this. The decision was to allow the unlimited use of the one allowed waco. The motion was made. seconded, and passed (13 for and 1 against) to accept the measurer's recommendation. The approval of the Waco 360 proposal requires a specification change and will be put on the agenda for the annual meeting.

Regarding the CMR on the profile of the board not being modified, the motion was made, seconded, and passed unanimously to accept and this will be published in the handbook revisions and "Scots 'N Water." The CMR on any liquid soap, etc. not being allowed to coat the hull was discussed. The motion was made, seconded, and passed unanimously to accept and this will be published in the handbook revisions and "Scots 'N Water."

INTERNATIONAL RACE COMMITTEE

Dave Jacobsen shared parts of the letter he sent Bill Rodge. Among other items, he advised him that the Masters would be sailed with the qualifiers. This represents the second year of the experimental format for the Masters. It was felt that one year was not an adequate test.

PUBLICITY/CLASS DEVELOPMENT

The report was presented by Cal Hudson, who states that we had good publicity in "Sailing World."

SCOTS n' WATER

Sunshine Hartman stated that she has been encouraged by the many people who have called her over the past six months. Everyone was urged to send in regatta reports and articles. The District Governors will be asked to organize articles from people who do not race. This is badly needed for there are far more members who do not race than who do.

ITEMS TO SELL

Larry Taggart called on Eubanks to report on the shirts. Thirty shirts were made and brought to this regatta. All were sold. The start up cost was \$200 and each shirt cost \$28. Staff is to look into having additional graphics put on the shirt with names added for sale at regattas. Eubanks will seek permission from the regatta chair before selling the FSSA shirts at regattas. One suggestion was to offer the host club \$1 for each shirt sold as an incentive. Hats are also available. They will be advertised for sale in the magazine.

REGATTAS

The St. Andrews Bay Yacht Club, in Panama City has written a letter inviting the FSSA back for the '95 Mid-Winters. Knight was instructed to write them that we would continue to return until they decided not to have it as long as things continue to go well. The 1994 Wife-Husband championship will be sailed at White Rock Lake. We have a bid from Lake Norman to do the Wife-Husband in '95 and one from Oswego to do the NAC in '96. Fleet 23 at Rush Creek in Texas is considering a bid for the NAC in '95. Pat Manicchia will see that the bid is officially submitted. Fleets 177 and 142 at Cedar Point have tentative plans to submit a bid for a future NAC. The 1994 NAC will be held at North Cape Yacht Club in Michigan.

CLASS DEVELOPMENT

Cal Hudson reported that a couple of new fleets are in and membership looks good reflecting slow growth. It would be helpful to look at membership numbers over the years for comparison. Hudson reported that the Masters Class is still be experimented on how best to run it. It will be tried one more time this year to run it during the qualifiers.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Bernie Knight reported that the executive committee recommends serializing and dating the Royalty Tags when it is time to reorder in order to better track manufactured dates of sails. Eubanks pointed out that "Scots n' Water" cost approximately \$15 per member per year. The dues show that \$8 goes toward a subscription to the magazine. There is a need to take a careful look at how money is spent, how to deal with costs, and how to restructure best to meet the needs. Carpenter would be willing to share his data base of boat owners with the association to promote membership. It was suggested that a magazine and application for membership be sent to each person on Carpenter's list who is not already member. Carpenter would be willing to send out a card designed to promote membership with his shipments and would also pass them out at boat shows. Carpenter and Eubanks will work on designing such a card.

US SAILING

This regatta and others are using the differential fee required by US Sailing. Knight is involved with the One Design Class Council and the Insure Committee. Knight reported on the Sail Expo where FSSA helped host a Flying Scot rendezvous and promote the value of owning a one design boat. It was discussed that holding a regatta party on the trade show floor would be a good idea to promote the value of one design sailing. Several industry suppliers and Sailing World have offered to provide sponsorship.

OTHER BUSINESS

Jacobsen reported on the Special Olympics which will be a major event. Four or five classes were looked at and they decided to use the Flying Scot. Jacobsen drafted a letter and asked the Fleet Captains to get it out. Also, Hartman was asked to do an article for "Scots n' Water." This is a big boost to the class.

Eubanks reported on the '96

Olympics in Savannah. She will write an article for "Scots 'n Water" to see if there is interest.

Knight announced that he would be giving out two plaques to the Allen Douglas family and Betty & Bo Smith in appreciation for their years of work on the Mid-Winters.

Twenty minutes. Port hi? Lo? Median? Starboard hi? Low? Median? Head to wind compass reading? Which side better wind? Better current? Which side better? Time to head back?

BAWOOM! Ten minutes. Luff tension ok? Which side better wind? Better current? Which side better? Head to wind compass reading? Pin set? Which end better current? Get line sight. Favored end? Preferred end? Time?

BAWOOM! Five minutes. Got line sight? Favored end? Head to wind compass reading? Which side better wind? Which side better? Preferred end? Where start on line? Type of approach? Time?

1-1/2 to 2 minutes. Preferred end still ok? Positioned for approach?

One minute! Look for hole. 40 seconds. Hole! Tack! Line sight? Protect OUR HOLE! Fall off... Luff! Luff! "Fifteen, Fourteen, Thirteen, Twelve..." Keep her moving. Line sight! Calm Down... "Nine, Eight, Seven..." Line sight? OK! Sheet in... Head up... "HIKE HER FLAT!" ... get her moving! Line sight? OK! "VANG ON NOW! HIKE FLAT!" Calm down... "Four, Three, Two, One..."

BAWOOM! calm down...calm down...calm down... Total focus. Nothing else matters. Eyes shift: bow...waves...bow...waves...bow... Think speed! Flat! Point! Waves! Vang?

Ignore '...Splooshh... Splooshh... Splooshh...' on weather quarter. Occasionally, as wind and waves allow, sheet in, pinch slightly upwind...try to gain advantage, but keep speed. HIKE...HARD...FLAT!


Great!...She tacked away. But did we force her? Or was it a header? Compass? When should we go? Now? Later? Sails ok? Decisions...

Check fleet, compass, sails all hike... HARD!

Third to halfway up leg, on port, coming back in toward middle. Been lonely...only a few of us out left, but now have some starboards coming in from right. Tack or hold port? ...lifted or headed?... what to do? Decisions...

Eighty yards from mark. On port, fairly clear air, going to starboard layline. Lots of starboard boats. When to tack? Are we there? What about that boat...tack or duck??? Must decide... NOW!...Spinnaker ready?

Rounding weather mark. Overlap?

Go high? Low? Other boats? Where next mark? Board up? Spinnaker? Puff or lull? Puff coming? Spinnaker up!

"Watch out! He's coming up...coming up!"

"Coming up slow...coming up more...Easy now...keep her flying..."

"OK...bearing off...bearing off..."

"OK, lets get this wave...lets get this wave. Here it comes. Back...Back, Get back HERE NOW! Keep it flat. Keep it flat..."

"OK, coming back up. Is that too high?"

"No, you can go a little more...there!"
"Here's the next one...Bearing
off...Back!...BACK!...Here we go!"

"Dangle gybe or end-for-end?"
"OVERLAP...GIVE ME ROOM!"

Great Gybe!

"Watch out! He's coming up...coming up!"

"Coming up slow...coming up more...Easy now...keep her flying..."

"OK...bearing off...bearing off..."

"Where's the mark? Got it, thanks."

"OK, here's a wave...lets get it...lets get it. Here it comes. Back...Back, Get back HERE NOW! Keep it flat. Keep it flat..."

"OK, coming back up. Is that too high?"

"No, you can go a little more...there!"
"Here's the next one...Bearing
off...Back! BACK!...Here we go!" "We
got him — "NO OVERLAP!"

Rounding leeward mark, Luff tension? Course change? Overlap? "Spinnaker Down!" Bad air from boat ahead? Tack to clear! Spinnaker clear? Headed or lifted? HEADED OR LIFTED? "HEADED!!" Tack back. Which side

course best? Which side is most of fleet ahead? Decide NOW!

Think boatspeed, think boatspeed, think boatspeed. Flat, vang, HIKE, HIKE, waves. headed . . . Headed . . . Still HEADED . . . TACK! Roll the boat! Hike flat! "Compass?" Gaining? Losing?

Dying wind . . . Dejection . . . Oh, Shh't! Other side big time inside lift. Trying to get there on little shifts, but not enough . . . What to do? Hope . . .

Big header coming? Headed? Wait... wait... headed ... more ... GO! We're coming back, we're coming back. Please hold ... please hold ... yes! YES! ... Ok! We're back in this race! Ohh ... what luck! Not like last time ...

Rounding weather mark. Course change? Overlap? Which gybe are boats already rounded? Wind backed or lifted? Which side favored? Leeward mark position? Regular or gybe set?

Which side favored? Where is most of fleet? Will wind die and shift like last leg? "Curl... CURL!... Pole back... BACK!... CURL!"

150 yards from leeward mark. Starboard run, headed above mark. Another starboard abeam to leeward. Slow down and gybe to try inside? Stay outside? Will they gybe? Who is it? Our/their gybing skill? "Are they looking? . . . quit . . . shssh . . ." Other boats? Shifts coming? Decide now! Else, time decides . . .

Rounding leeward mark. Course change? Overlap? Which side weather leg favored? Distance to boats ahead... boats behind? Final leg objective . . . maintain or gain? Which side favored? Need to cover? Loose or tight?

200 yards to finish. Covering steadily gaining boat. Boat ahead covering. Boat behind tacks. Boat ahead tacks. We're clear! Stay or split? Lifted or headed? Wind shift ahead? Other boats' positions? Which end favored?

Finish! Did you see...? How'd we do? Let's see... "one, two, three..."

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

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Measurement Activity at the Midwinter Governors Meeting

- 1. The following CMRs were submitted by the Measurement Committee and approved by the Board
- 71. The profile of the board shall not be modified; however, normal wear and tear to the bottom forward corner of the centerboard will not be considered a change in profile as defined in article S II par 4. This area may be repaired, if needed to bring the board back to a standard profile.
- 72. The use of any liquid soap, detergent, soap or any such wetting agent applied to coat the hull, center-board or rudder is prohibited under the provisions of S-V-3. Any such material may be used to clean the hull, but must be removed (squeaky clean) prior to launching the boat.

Please add them to your Handbook

2. The Board also considered an amendment to the specification pro-

posed by Fleet #157. Pursuant to Article XX para 3.

Fleet #157 proposes that the measurement rules that currently restrict the use of the Waco 360 to control only the centerboard or the cunningham, be eliminated. These restrictions are found in Specifications, #5, paragraph 1-RUNNING RIGGING and paragraph f-Boom Vang, and again in Chief Measurer's rulings #58.

This proposed amendment was reviewed by the measurement committee and has recommended to the Board that the specification be so amended.

The Governing Board directed the Measurement Committee to draft the appropriate amendments to the specifications for formal ratification.

The following amendment to the specification to allow use of the one

360 swivel cleat for any permitted system has been ratified by the Governing Board. Three changes are required to the specification:

1. Change the last sentence in ARTICLE S-III para 5

From: In addition, only one 360 swivel cleat (similar in design and principle to the WACO 360) may be mounted on the sides of the centerboard trunk, and shall be limited to the use for either the centerboard pennant or cunningham.

To: In addition, only one 360 swivel cleat (similar in design and principle to the WACO 360) may be mounted on the sides of the centerboard trunk, and may be used to control any permitted system of the owner's choosing.

2. Eliminate the next-to-last sentence in Article S-III para 5.f as follows:


Eliminated sentence: No swivel cleating device is permitted in this system.

3. Change CMR 58 to eliminate restriction

From: There shall be no more than one 360 degree swivel cleat (similar in design and principle to the WACO 360) in the boat which, if employed, must be mounted on the sides of the centerboard trunk for use only with either the centerboard pennant or the cunningham.

To: There shall be no more than one 360 degree swivel cleat (similar in design and principal to the WACO 360) in the boat which, if employed, must be mounted on the sides of the centerboard trunk for use with any permitted system.

This change will be voted on at the Annual Meeting at the Nationals. A two thirds majority needs to vote for this change, for it to be passed. Please let your fleet captains and District Governors know what your feelings are regarding these changes.
